



# How to Confirm that Someone is ACTUALLY a Lawyer


## Licensed California Attorneys

Practicing Attorneys MUST have an Active license with the California State Bar\*

### How to Check a License

- Ask for the attorney's full name / state bar number
- California State Bar Attorney Search:

<https://apps.calbar.ca.gov/attorney/LicenseeSearch/QuickSearch>



- Confirm the person's information matches the information on record with the state Bar.
- Make sure the license status is **Active**

What Different License Statuses Mean:

Status	Definition
Active	Only active licensees may practice law in California.
Inactive	Applies to licensees who choose voluntarily not to practice. They may return at any time to active status by paying required fees and complying as necessary with any fingerprinting requirements.
Not Eligible to Practice Law	May not practice law in California. Reasons may include suspension, involuntary transfer to inactive status, failure to pay mandatory fees, MCLE noncompliance, and voluntary resignation petition pending with the Supreme Court.
Disbarred	Prohibited from practicing law in California by order of the California Supreme Court.
Resigned	May not practice law in California. Their resignation has been accepted by the California Supreme Court and may have been submitted with or without disciplinary charges pending.
RIHC	Registered In-House Counsel are out-of-state attorneys. They have complied with <a href="#">rules</a> permitting them to practice in California on a limited basis.
RLAA	Registered Legal Aid Attorneys are out-of-state attorneys. They have complied with <a href="#">rules</a> permitting them to practice in California on a limited basis.
RMSA	Registered Military Spouse Attorneys are out-of-state attorneys. They have complied with <a href="#">rules</a> permitting them to practice in California on a limited basis.

### Notes

\*For some federal law matters an attorney may be licensed in a state outside of California. You can search the state bar website of where that attorney is licensed to confirm their credentials

### You Should Know

- Practicing law without a license is a crime (CA Bus & Prof Code 6125 &6126).
- Soliciting (offering services for a fee) is against the Law Library's Rules of Conduct
- Incorrect or incomplete legal advice may damage your claims or your ability to pursue your rights.**
